Royal Recognition is Well Deserved

Kay Leslie celebrates Jurat Mike Tanguy's recognition in the New Year's Honour's List

When MBE recipient, Jurat Michael Tanguy, was described recently as "an impressive driver", a group of well-wishers was fully aware that the description had nothing to do with his motoring skills. Whatever the popular chairman of the Guernsey Alzheimer's Association applies his considerable ability to, does well and develops in a way that sometimes was never even thought of. He plays down his efforts for the Association, Les Bourgs Hospice, Le Platon and Les Cotils but there is no doubt that he is often the main driver, if not the initiator, behind many impressive schemes and developments.

Having been awarded the MBE for public and voluntary services here in the island, he suggested that it was actually recognition for the teams of people around him, but much of what has been achieved is the result of his long term effort and focus. That, coupled with an ability to think broadly about what will provide most benefit to the island in any situation, has made him much in demand in the charitable sector.

On a personal level, Mike is particularly pleased that the GAA negotiated some tricky political waters to emerge from the large, mainland society. "We have always wanted to be able to assure our supporters that we are using any funding directly to help as efficiently as possible. There are no third sector salaries here," he said proudly.

He hopes that the award will raise the profile of the GAA generally, and is especially keen to see the medical profession build on earlier approaches and work closely with the Association to ensure that those in need of care and support can benefit from help available.

Those who invite the former Jurat to become involved with any organisation know that, if he accepts after a considered response, he will maintain that link for as long as needs be. That can have an interesting effect on projects outside voluntary work as his wife, Elizabeth, knows well.

"We were building a house when he joined (Les Bourgs) Hospice and Alzheimer's (GAA) so things were rather hectic," she recalled. As chairman of the Board of Governors at Les Bourgs Hospice, he recently oversaw a comprehensive £4 million rebuild of the charity's site in St Andrew, and is in discussion about some interesting changes for Le Platon and Les Cotils. The bad news for Elizabeth is that there is also another fairly major house project in the wings.

Now, with the theme of "Caring for Carers", the excellent centre at Delancey welcomes visitors seeking companionship and help, sometimes during or after having cared for a loved one.

Monday and Wednesday afternoons are enjoyed by many carers and, on alternate Fridays, others come to "Singing Down Memory Lane" sessions.


Monthly, our resident chef produces an excellent lunch, usually for more than 40 guests. Generous support from Deutsche Bank International enables us to offer all of these events without charge.

DEMENTIA CONFERENCE

21 November 2012

"World's most challenging illness" says leading authority on dementia

The dementia conference was held at Holy Trinity Church and attracted speakers and 200 delegates from across the UK and Channel Islands. Dr Subee Banerjee, who was a tour de force behind making and maintaining the UK Dementia Strategy and was the author of the government report into reducing the use of anti psychotic medication on people with dementia, gave a lively presentation about developing a dementia strategy. Anne Rollings (South West Dementia Partnership) discussed the importance of ensuring people with dementia had a voice in planning and developing services and introduced


a resource pack she had been instrumental in developing so that people with dementia could be supported and be involved. Professor Bob Woods detailed how the of relationships can improve the person with dementia's quality of life and enhance their quality of care. Rachael Thompson talked about her research regarding the quality of care people with dementia receive when they came into the acute general hospital; sadly, people were often left bewildered and frightened by the experience. She did, however, say that much work is being done

nationally to introduce dementia-friendly environments and to equip staff with the skills and knowledge to ensure a high standard and quality

Although the conference attracted several eminent national speakers, it was the "real" people who stole the show. Edna Smith gave a very moving and personal account of caring for her husband, John, who had Alzheimer's disease and the highs and lows she encountered during her husband's journey. During the day there were also two videos from a local person who has dementia and his

wife describing the lived experience of dementia. Delegates commented on how powerful hearing someone's personal account was and made the experience of dementia more real.
